



Alignment

Building and sustaining an impact network

- · Sustain a diverse network of Santa Clara County staff for regional climate initiatives.
- · Include all sectors: public, private, and non-profit.
- Provide an inclusive platform for professionals in climate-related fields.
- Develop partnerships to fund programs enhancing climate resilience.

Amplification

Developing a Regional Resilience Fund

- · Align youth climate efforts with the Climate Collaborative.
- · Support youth leadership, education, and partnerships.
- Expand the Santa Clara Climate Resilience Leadership Academy for CBOs.
- Establish the Santa Clara County Climate Resilience Accelerator Program.
- · Create a countywide energy concierge program.
- · Develop models and policies for climate-resilient municipalities.
- Improve access to climate data and tools for program design within the Collaborative.

Activation

Building capacity and accelerating best practices

- Establish a regional resilience fund, driven by Collaborative participants. The process and priorities for the establishment of this fund are:
- Complete a Resilience Fund Project Prioritization and Implementation Plan.
- · Secure seed funding to launch and pilot the Resilience Fund concept.
- Explore and develop a public/private/community partnership model.


Net zero emissions – Set ambitious targets to decrease greenhouse gas emissions countrywide and across local jurisdictions.

Empower communities to increase/build resilience to climate change – Apply a community centered approach to mitigate impacts of climate threats and build the capacity to withstand and recover from events.

Eliminate flood risk – Undertake collaborative efforts between public agencies and communities for flood risk elimination.

Prepare communities for extreme heat & improving air quality – Help communities reduce the impacts of extreme heat and impaired air quality through a multifaceted approach.



Achieving Net Zero Emission

- 1. Advocate for increased grid resilience and initiatives to prioritize service to LIDAC/underserved communities first.
- 2. Accelerate building electrification with emphasis on public buildings, with countywide funding models.
- 3. Support **creation of a countywide energy concierge program**, incentives and guides for privately owned buildings, and multifamily units.
- **4. Integrate CBOs into building electrification initiatives** and advocate for electrification programs, e.g. EV charging stations to serve and support LIDAC/underserved neighborhoods and communities first.
- 5. Prioritize and support **countywide emission reductions in the transportation sector** through non-vehicle mobility options
- 6. Develop a **countywide electric vehicle charging infrastructure plan**.



Decrease Flood Risk

- 1. Help **develop shoreline adaptation plans** to meet state requirements.
- 2. Focus on **building political will with shoreline communities** and seek funding for large-scale shoreline protection projects with habitat and flood protection.
- 3. Create a funding source for nature base solutions and green infrastructure Identify, develop, and fund nature-based resilience projects where nature is viewed as infrastructure.
- 4. Launch a countywide green belt initiative to expand connected natural ecosystems.
- 5. Work with land and conservation managers to align traditional agricultural practices with carbon sequestration, habitat restoration, and floodplain management.



Prepare Communities for Extreme Heat

- 1. Create and share a map of all the existing resilience hubs, and the resources available at each.
- 2. Secure funding to support countywide tree planting, greening and landscape initiatives to reduce heat islands.
- 3. Build a community of practice to help communities address heat and air quality though creating a collaborative framework
- 4. Develop and share model air quality & heat mitigation and adaptation strategies, policies, and plans that prioritize vulnerable communities (HAQR Goal).
- 5. Support the **implementation of projects that advance community resilience to heat and air quality issues for priority populations** such as seniors, unhoused, children, farmworkers (HAQR Goal).
- **6. Engage communities on the impacts of climate change and solutions** and resources available to mitigate health impacts (HAQR Goal).



Empower Communities to Build Resilience


- 1. Establish baseline data on the level of understanding of climate resilience and climate change impacts across the county.
- 2. Develop and implement a **training program for people new to the climate space** to discuss climate issues.
- 3. Create resources for addressing climate change impacts in CBOs missions, via operational resilience and identification of how climate change exacerbates existing vulnerabilities of served populations
- 4. **Create a sustained funding source for CBOs** that provides multi-year support.
- 5. Establish a capacity building program that includes direct funding for CBO capacity and access to climate data, communications, disaster preparedness and high-touch technical assistance.
- **6. Enlist funded CBOs to serve as mentors** for new or newly identified CBOs
- 7. Develop an Equity Plan


National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) Phase 2 Project



Project Overview: Phase II

- Map connectivity of bay, streams, and greenspaces
- Develop framework to identify high value Nature Based Solutions (NbS) to address flooding and climate resilience
- Identify two Socially Vulnerable Communities to pilot framework
- Work with pilot communities to develop implementation plan and strategies
- Update the Climate Resilience Webtool


Project Objectives

 - Improving community livability


